Bruneau began his coaching career at the age of 18 while he was still a student. Five years later, he made his first overseas trip with Tennis Canada, which would be the beginning of a great adventure. Since then, he has made his way up to the position of National Head Coach for the women's program. During his 35-year career, he coached and supported Canada's top junior and professional players with one only goal in mind: help them to reach their full potential. Throughout his career, Bruneau has showed his sporting and human values while demonstrating his tactical skills and ability to analyze the game. These skills have helped establish him as a renowned and respected coach, both in Canada and on the international circuit.
